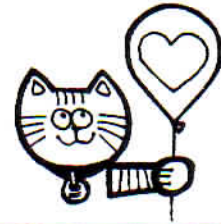

Get a large grocery sack. Cut a big hole in one side. Now the sack is a great cat toy, wonderful for climbing into and out of. (Tip the sack on its side.)

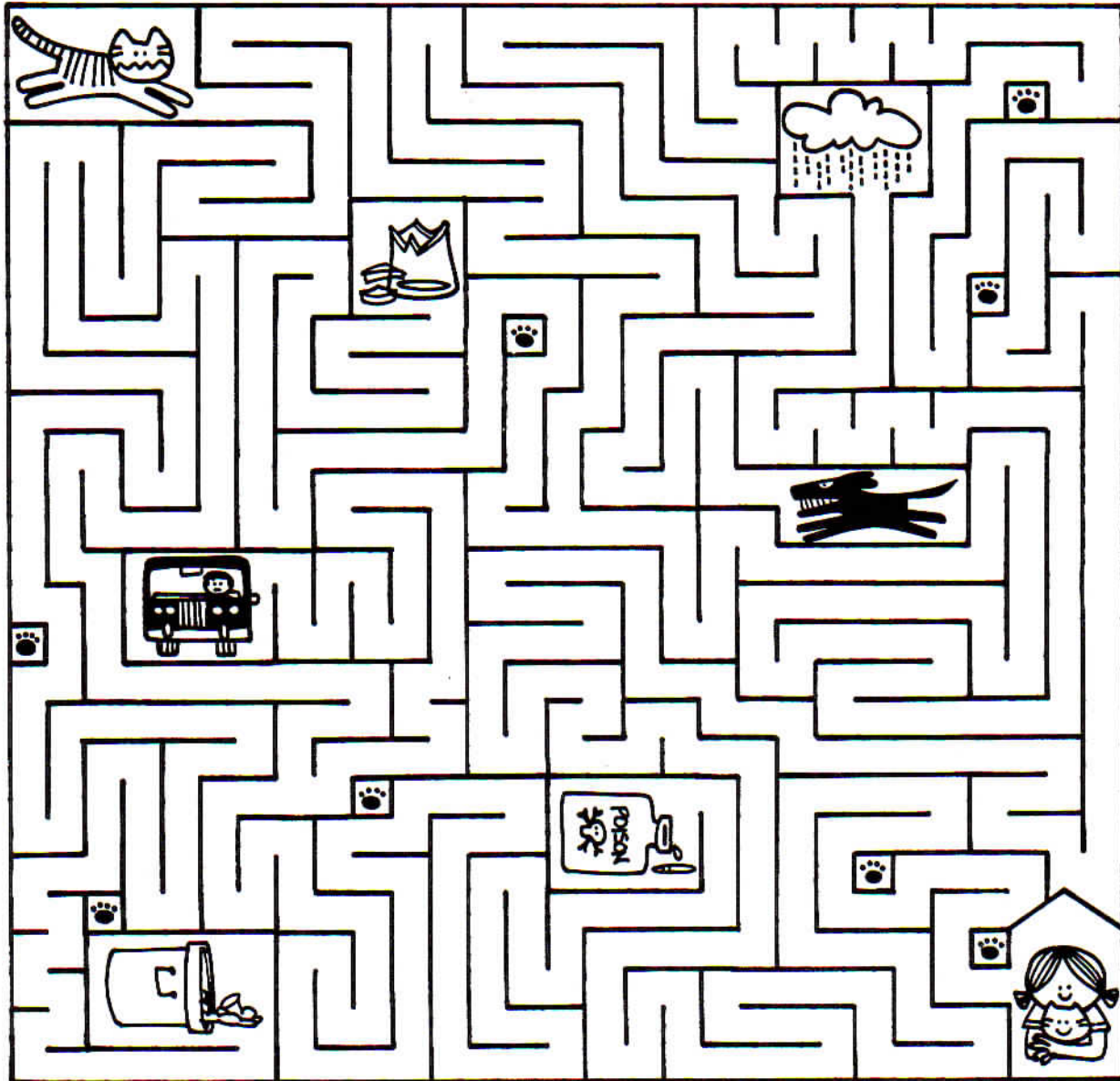


On the back, design codes for the letters not shown in the puzzle.

Keep a cat indoors all the time? You bet! Cats that are not kept inside face many hazards. Help this cat find his way through the maze to inside his safe house.



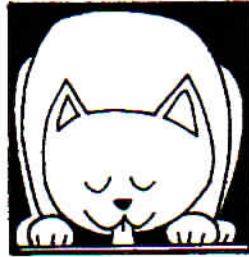
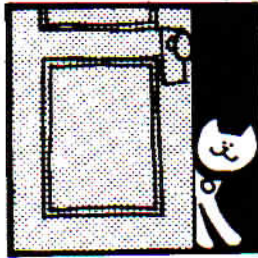
